

Dunhuang Culture: A Bridge for Global Cultural Exchange and Integration

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Abstract: Dunhuang culture, as an outstanding representation of the Silk Road's diverse civilizations, exemplifies fundamental patterns of global cultural interaction through its profound historical legacy and unique artistic expressions. Utilizing historical evidence and artistic analysis, this paper examines the pivotal significance of Dunhuang in facilitating dialogue among civilizations. Firstly, its strategic geographical location made Dunhuang a crucial nexus where the agricultural civilization of China's Central Plains, Indian Buddhist philosophy, and nomadic cultures of the Western Regions intersected following the opening of the Silk Road during the Han Dynasty. The evolution of the "Flying Apsaras" (Feitian) imagery depicted in the Mogao Grottoes murals and the coexistence of multiple religious beliefs during the Tibetan (Tubo) period vividly illustrate dynamic processes of cultural fusion, innovation, and reinvention. Secondly, depictions of urban life, characterized by diverse caravan attire and multilingual literature, highlight the historical globalization of material exchange and spiritual interaction. Thirdly, within the contemporary digital context, the "Digital Dunhuang" project transcends physical boundaries to facilitate the global dissemination of cultural resources. In alignment with China's strategic "One Belt, One Road" initiative, the Dunhuang Expo establishes a new mechanism for civilizational dialogue, transforming traditional wisdom into strategic resources to address modern challenges. This inclusive model of cultural integration not only serves as a historical reference for constructing a global community with a shared future but also redefines cultural heritage preservation through technological innovation, thereby continuously expanding the practical boundaries of intercultural dialogue.

1. Introduction

Dunhuang culture, as a treasured part of both Chinese and global cultural heritage, not only embodies rich historical connotations and artistic value but also serves as a vivid testament to the exchange and integration of Eastern and Western cultures along the ancient Silk Road. It holds significant research value and importance. Situated at a strategic point along the Silk Road, Dunhuang has long been a meeting ground for multiple ethnic groups and a hub for East-West cultural exchange. This unique geographical position has attracted the confluence of diverse ethnic cultures throughout history. Scholars have conducted detailed research on Dunhuang culture. For example, Kong Lingjin explores the digital dissemination model of cultural heritage at the Mogao Caves and its implications for the digital promotion of other cultural heritages.[1] Cao Qin examines the exchange of Tang and Tibetan

cultures through Dunhuang contract documents.[2] Hou Jingmin analyzes the dissemination paths of Dunhuang culture under the Belt and Road Initiative ((BRI).[3] These studies not only highlight the social and cultural significance of Dunhuang culture but also confirm its deep historical roots. Building on this body of research, this paper explores the pivotal role Dunhuang culture has played in cultural exchange throughout history and its function as a bridge for cultural integration, thereby further investigating its crucial value and significance in promoting global cultural exchange and integration.

2. A natural bridge for cultural exchanges

Dunhuang is located at the western end of the Hexi Corridor in Gansu Province. Since ancient times, it has served as a vital transportation hub connecting the Central Plains with the Western Regions, Central Asia, and Europe. This unique geographical position has made Dunhuang a crucial node for East-West civilizational exchange, naturally establishing it as a bridge at the intersection of geography and history. Starting from the reign of Emperor Wu of the Han Dynasty, large numbers of migrants from the Central Plains arrived in Dunhuang.[4] They not only brought advanced agricultural techniques and Confucian ideology but also enriched the local cultural foundation with Han culture. Over time, Han culture became deeply rooted in Dunhuang, forming a core component of Dunhuang culture. Around the same period, Zhang Qian's successful diplomatic missions to the Western Regions facilitated increasingly frequent exchanges between the Western Regions and the Central Plains. Diplomatic delegations from various Western Region states visited the Han court, leading to the formal opening of the Silk Road. From that point onward, Dunhuang became a center for trade and cultural exchange, witnessing the footprints of countless merchants and the fusion of Eastern and Western civilizations. Among these exchanges, the interaction between Han culture and Indian Buddhist culture was particularly remarkable. The murals and sculptures in the Mogao Caves are products of the fusion of Buddhist art with traditional Chinese artistic techniques. During the Tibetan rule in the Tang Dynasty, Dunhuang became a place where Buddhism, Taoism, Bon, Nestorianism, Zoroastrianism, and Manichaeism coexisted. The Tibetan people, who were devout Buddhists, regarded Dunhuang as a Buddhist center and vigorously supported the construction of monasteries. This promotion of Buddhism led to the rapid expansion of the monastery economy, which in turn provided the material foundation for the further development of Buddhism in Dunhuang, reflecting an increasingly secularized tendency within Dunhuang Buddhism.[2] The diverse cultural exchanges and collisions gave rise to the Mogao Caves and the Library Cave (Cangjingdong), which stand as testaments to the perfect integration of multiple civilizations. This cultural exchange and integration not only enriched the connotation of Dunhuang culture but also infused new vitality into the pluralistic development of Chinese civilization. All of these exchanges were conducted along the Silk Road, underscoring Dunhuang's enduring role as a bridge for East-West cultural exchange.

3. Concrete manifestations of cultural integration

Dunhuang culture, as a brilliant pearl on the ancient Silk Road, vividly reflects the grand picture of global cultural exchange and integration through a series of tangible artistic expressions and profound cultural connotations.

3.1. Reconstruction of buddhist art

The image of Feitian (Flying Apsaras) in Dunhuang murals is a quintessential example of the perfect fusion of Buddhist art with traditional Chinese painting techniques. The Feitian figure, as a distinctive symbol of Buddhist art, originates from ancient Indian mythology as a celestial being who follows the Buddha. After Buddhism spread to western China, early stone cave murals began to feature Feitian

figures, often retaining distinct Indian stylistic characteristics. [5] Indian Feitian figures are characterized by soaring postures and graceful, lightweight physiques, often conveying an ethereal beauty detached from the mundane world. However, in Dunhuang murals, Feitian figures absorbed Chinese traditional painting techniques and aesthetics. During the Northern Dynasties period, Feitian figures retained the weighty feel of Gandhara art, but by the Sui and Tang Dynasties, the figures became fully localized. The Feitian figures of this period are depicted with more elegant and fluid postures, and the use of color became richer and more refined. In the murals, Feitian are often portrayed dancing gracefully or playing musical instruments, with flowing ribbons fluttering around them. The details of the figures' attire and hairstyles reflect elements of ancient Chinese female aesthetics, aligning the figures with traditional Chinese artistic preferences. The Dunhuang Feitian also skillfully combined the Indian Buddhist concept of Feitian with the Taoist imagery of "Yuren" (Feathered Beings), forming a distinctive "Dunhuang Feitian" style. This artistic synthesis endowed the Feitian figures with both the solemnity and mystery of Buddhism and the ethereal grace of Taoism, making them a vivid testament to the creative transformation of Silk Road civilizations.

3.2. The internationalization of secular life

The murals in Dunhuang also capture lively scenes of trade and daily life along the Silk Road, reflecting the prosperity of East-West trade. For example, the depictions of foreign merchants and camel caravans provide a vivid portrayal of the bustling commercial activity. The foreign merchants are often shown wearing exotic clothing, holding precious goods, and traveling through deserts and oases. These merchants came from different countries and regions, bringing valuable goods and cultural influences that they exchanged with Chinese traders. Clothing styles depicted in the murals also serve as a direct reflection of the material and cultural blending in Dunhuang. The wide-sleeved robes of the Han Dynasty, the luxurious silk garments of the Tang Dynasty, and the close-fitting attire influenced by Western Regions' styles all coexist in the murals. This diversity of clothing reflects not only the open and inclusive nature of Dunhuang society but also the harmonious integration of different cultures in daily life. An example of this cultural blending is found in Cave 45's mural, "Encounter with Robbers by Foreign Merchants". In this painting, the protagonist wears a Persian-style rolled-brim hat while having his hair bound in a traditional Chinese headwrap. The goods carried by the camel caravan include glassware from Central Asia, spices from India, and silk from China, illustrating the vibrant international trade and cultural exchange along the Silk Road. 3.3. Multilingual coexistence

As a key hub along the Silk Road, Dunhuang also stands out for its coexistence of multiple languages and scripts, which serves as another powerful testament to cultural exchange and integration. The Dunhuang manuscripts include not only a large number of Chinese texts but also Tibetan, Sogdian, and other languages. [7] This multilingual coexistence provides valuable materials for studying the historical and cultural interactions among various ethnic groups along the Silk Road. The widespread use of Chinese characters reflects the deep influence of Central Plains culture on Dunhuang. Chinese manuscripts account for the majority of the Dunhuang texts, covering fields such as history, literature, religion, and art, offering rich insights into the social, political, and cultural life of ancient Dunhuang. These texts document the historical transformations and cultural developments in Dunhuang, reflecting the far-reaching influence of Central Plains culture. The appearance of Tibetan and other minority scripts, meanwhile, reflects the multi-ethnic and multi-cultural reality of Dunhuang. The Tibetan manuscripts provide crucial information about the political, economic, and cultural activities of the Tibetan people in Dunhuang, shedding light on the exchange and integration between Tibetan and Han cultures. Additionally, the discovery of Sogdian and other Western scripts further confirms

Dunhuang's status as a key transit point and cultural exchange center along the Silk Road. The coexistence of multiple languages not only facilitated communication and understanding between different ethnic groups but also laid a solid foundation for the diversified development of Dunhuang culture.

4. Contemporary significance and global impact

From its historical role as a commercial hub on the ancient Silk Road to its current status as a UNESCO World Heritage Site, Dunhuang has borne witness to centuries of cultural exchange and integration between East and West. Dunhuang culture not only embodies the profound cultural heritage of the Chinese nation but also absorbs and integrates the essence of foreign cultures, forming a unique cultural landscape. This inclusiveness and openness provide valuable insights for contemporary global cultural exchange and integration. The transformation of Dunhuang's cultural significance over different historical periods reflects an evolving understanding of cultural heritage preservation—shifting from static preservation to dynamic transmission.

The "Digital Dunhuang" project represents a significant innovation in the dynamic transmission of cultural heritage. As a model for cultural heritage preservation and innovation, "Digital Dunhuang" holds profound significance for global cultural heritage protection. The harsh desert climate and persistent sand erosion have inflicted severe damage on the Mogao Caves, threatening the integrity of the murals and sculptures. [8] In response, the Dunhuang Academy proposed the concept of "Digital Dunhuang" in the 1990s, aiming to preserve and protect the Mogao Caves and their artistic treasures through modern digital technologies and resources. The goal was to create a comprehensive digital archive of the murals and caves, ensuring their long-term preservation and accessibility. [9] "Digital Dunhuang" has not only achieved the permanent digital preservation of the Mogao Caves' murals but also made them accessible to a global audience through online platforms. For example, the Dunhuang Academy, in collaboration with Google Arts & Culture, launched the "Virtual Cave Tour" feature, allowing users worldwide to experience the beauty of the Mogao Caves from the comfort of their homes. Through high-resolution imaging, 3D modeling, and virtual reality technology, users can explore the details of the murals and sculptures, gaining an immersive understanding of Dunhuang's artistic and cultural significance. Under the Belt and Road Initiative, Dunhuang has also regained its historical role as a bridge for cultural exchange between East and West. The Dunhuang International Cultural Expo, held regularly since 2016, serves as a key platform for global cultural exchange and cooperation. The expo brings together representatives from various countries, including scholars, artists, and policymakers, to engage in dialogue and collaboration on cultural heritage preservation, artistic exchange, and creative industries. By showcasing Dunhuang's artistic and cultural achievements to a global audience, the expo promotes cross-cultural dialogue and reinforces the concept of "harmony in diversity." The event has also facilitated international cooperation in fields such as archaeology, art restoration, and cultural tourism, fostering deeper understanding and respect among different civilizations.

5. Conclusion

From the echoing camel bells of the ancient trade routes to the virtual corridors of "Digital Dunhuang," Dunhuang has stood at the crossroads of civilizations for centuries. The murals of the Mogao Caves, where Buddhist imagery blends with Western artistic styles, and the manuscripts of the Library Cave, where diverse scripts record the wisdom of multiple civilizations, reflect the harmonious coexistence of cultural differences. The shifting sands of the Singing Sand Dunes have preserved the cultural DNA of "harmony in diversity."
